


### CYBER DISCOVERY—Great Online Opportunity!

#### Tim Berners-Lee 1955 in London

In December 1980, Berners-Lee proposed a project based on the concept of hypertext, to facilitate sharing and updating information among researchers. While there, he built a prototype system called Enquire.

The first website built was at <a href="http://info.cern.ch/">http://info.cern.ch/</a> and was put online on 6 August 1991. The URL is still in use today. It provided an explanation of the worldwide web, how one could own a browser and how to set up a web server. It was also the world's first web directory, since Berners-Lee maintained a list of other websites. Today he continue to work on shaping the future of the web through his work with the World Wide Web Consortium (W3C) and the World Wide Web Foundation.
